Goudhurst and Kilndown CEP School - 2017-18 review

Goudhurst and Kilndown is a one form entry school with a proud sporting tradition. The school receives £17,800 in School Premium money for the academic year 2017-18. The school will use this money to employ a specialist PE teacher who will teach all the classes PE once a fortnight, help class teachers to develop their own planning and teaching, oversee assessment and prepare teams and squads for inter and intra school competitions. Sports funding money will also be used to restock Sports equipment, contribute towards the travel costs and minibus upkeep cost, pay the WOKSSA subscription and make a contribution towards the costs of staffing and facilitating Forest School.

The funding is provided by the government to ensure impact against the following Objective:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools.

With this in mind we looked at improvement against the following five key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - kick starting healthy active lifestyles
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport
